

The rear of 222 Timor St has been transformed through the design of Matthew Morse, brought to life by the Taylors. Image supplied.






The light-filled interior of the short-term apartment that sits adjacent to the Taylor's home. Image supplied.

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After: the guest room is now a room of character and warmth with most of the original features remaining.






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Luke Taylor and son Lewis in an area that was once a small bedroom has now become a shower room with a feature sandstone wall.






Old meets new: bits of original corrugated iron and rendered sandstone remain a feature of the very modern ensuite.

After a good clean up and some extra arty additions, the window forms part of the Biba hairdressing salon.



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
Original wallpaper stencils uncovered during the renovation and which remain intact in the Taylor's home.





The rear of 222 Timor St before, during and well and truly under construction. Image supplied.






The rear entrance to the short-term apartment that sits beside the Taylor's home. Image supplied.






Remnants of old newspaper revealed under the render and which have been preserved as part of the character of the new home.




The new apartments have been attached to the rear of the original building that dates back to the 1850s and remains the oldest, intact commercial building in Warrnambool. Image supplied.
